

Legal Training for Regulators & Enforcement

Regulators' code, principles of regulatory function, judicial review, legal implications and risk are concepts that, to those with limited regulatory knowledge, seem rather abstract. Part of our Law & Legal Awareness series, this training course will help to demystify the legal concepts and terminology that underpin regulatory systems, clarify their workings within the European Union and highlight any international law issues that can arise.

Like any other public bodies, regulators' decisions can face legal challenge. Through the use of case studies and examples, this legal awareness course offers delegates insights into how regulators defend their judgements. Delegates will gain clarity in judicial interpretation of regulators remit, ensuring that robust decisions are made that can be defended in a case of Judicial Review being granted.

Aim

Methodology

Workshop methods and tools

- Presentations: presentations will be used in order to provide the background of each subject and create discussion and questions.
- Discussions: throughout the training, participants will be encouraged to contribute to discussions and share their experiences and thoughts with the rest of the group. The discussions will be facilitated and coordinated by the facilitator in order to maintain the focus in the key areas of interest
- Case studies: case studies will be used so as to facilitate and trigger discussion, as well as allow external benchmarking so as to achieve competitiveness
- Group work: group work will be used in order to facilitate practical understanding of the issues and in order to enhance team working, team building and cooperation amongst participants
